Reports on ISPPD Events (Oct-Dec 2020)



Teacher training programs are the need of hour. These sessions enable us to keep abreast with the changing tides in education. They provide a platform to learn and relearn the skills and ethics of being a good mentor, enabling us to ensure a brighter tomorrow for the future dental professionals.

Adult learning and role of teacher: Dr. Sivakumar Nuvvula Emphasised on the role of a teachers in guiding the adult learner. Dental education is different from that in schools as we are now only mentoring the learner towards their destination and are gently nudging the learner from being a beginner to gaining expertise and in the process progressing from the techniques of pedagogy to andragogy to heutagogy. As guides, we facilitate a learning process from simple observership to that of actually performing the task. It is imperative to work towards understanding those under our tutelage and to match their level of learning with our teaching competence.

Taxonomy of teaching and learning educational objectives: Dr. Latha Anandkrishna: walked us through the various definitions in our educational system. She emphasized on how an ideal curriculum should be deliberate, systematic and planned. We are now acquainted with the core competencies and educational objectives that we should ensure that the learners should imbibe and how they should progress in the cognitive, psychomotor and affective domains. Learning as she emphasized, should be holistic, student centric and based on educational objectives

Communication skills: Dr. Jayant Vagha: As Dr. Vagha rightly said, The art of medicine is intricately tied to the art of communication and is an important aspect of patient care. It is true that communication, both verbal and non verbal should definitely be emphasized upon in our curriculum,

that will equip our graduates and postgraduates to not only be better team leaders and players, but to truly empathize, sympathize and communicate with the patients and other stakeholders, making us more compassionate practitioners.

Fundamentals and Principles of assessment: Dr. Anshula Deshpande: Assessment is truly a key component of learning. We need to assess both the learner's cognition as well as their performance, through methods that are effective, reliable and transparent. Assessment through the various modes, be it formative/ summative, objective or subjective are essential for us to gauge whether the goal of education is actually being met and also enables us to evaluate not only the student, but also ourselves as educators.

How to construct multiple choice questions: D. Ashok Jaryal: Appraised us all on the various dimensions of knowledge that can be tested through the MCQ pattern of evaluation, be it factual, procedural or meta cognitive. He emphasized on the correct methods to frame such questions in a relevant, valid, reliable and non biased manner, that truly serves the purpose of assessing the examinees domain of knowledge.

How to make comprehensive theory paper: Dr. Latha: taught the necessity of blueprinting to ensure a match between the curriculum and assessment system. We were appraised on the art of setting a relevant, structured paper with proper validity and weightage, in accordance with the level of knowledge that requires to be assessed in order to better evaluate the learner.

Evocative VivaVoce: Dr. Gauri Lele: Emphasised on how a verbal examination should be conducted such that it is valid, relevant, objective and feasible in accordance with the educational objectives. We gained valuable tips on how to make it more structured and non biased and how to make it a more pleasant experience for our mentees, rather than it being a discouraging experience for them. This lecture also emphasized on the importance of us, as examiners, evaluating ourselves and being ready to modify our viva voce methods for the benefit of the student.




Chair Side Assessment: Dr. Richa Khanna: This was a very informative lecture on on how to conduct chairside evaluation, whereby we can both shape and measure clinical learning. She emphasized on the various tools we can use to assess the students' clinical encounter with the patient and observe their clinical skills, separately and in combination. It was a beautiful amalgamation the need of such assessments, the tools required and the proper designing of such assessments.

Ethics of teaching and giving feedback: Dr. Vijay Mathur: Emphasized on how we as teachers need to be armed with integrity, impartiality, ethical behavior and good moral conduct. He told us on how we as teachers must continue learning and evaluating ourselves. How we need to innovate our teaching methods to teach better and how to have healthy relationships with the students. He also spoke about how we must not only provide feedback to the students in a professional, ethical manner but should ourselves be open to it, in order to improve ourselves. We as mentors are not only shaping the future dental professionals, but also the next generation of teachers.

Interactive teaching method: large group: Dr. Gauri lele: The Current education scenario has become more learner centered. Teaching a large group allows efficient means of knowledge transfer and allows information to be provided that needs to be synthesized from many sources. The strategies of planning, preparing, practicing and presenting are strategies that can make a lecture more effective. Our roles have shifted from that of an instructor to facilitator and thus we need to incorporate activities that not only increase student engagement and recall but also cater to their different learning styles.

Interactive teaching method: small group: Dr. Anshula Deshpande: Spoke about how an inquiry leads to problem solving resulting in discovery. The advantages and various methods of breaking a larger group into small units to facilitate better learning were enumerated. The keys of learning, interaction, development, leadership and student engagement as well as the skills required by the instructor were also emphasized on which would ensure a more desirable way of student centred teaching.

Effective use of media and web teaching methods: Mr. Yogesh Kumar: Gave a very effective and interesting lecture about the different types of media that are available to encourage learning and the various advantages that one has over the other. He also spoke about how more the involved senses, better the learning. He emphasized on how a teacher must think big, exploit the strengths of media to help in better understanding of the concepts to acquire the right skills. He also stressed on out of the box thinking and encouraged teachers to look beyond the obvious and hunt for creative solutions to problems.



The peer review/ editorial cycle: Dr. Sharath Asokan elaborated on the editorial cycle that a manuscript goes through once it is submitted and the due process thereafter. He stressed on how a peer review is the gatekeeper to good quality control for publications in journals. We were informed about the various types of blinding in peer reviews, about how reviewers are chosen by editors and the various expectations from the reviewer at different stage of the process. The best reviewers should impartially critique the manuscript for its strength and weaknesses, provide constructive feedback, have no conflicts of interest and should ensure that the authors don't overstate their conclusions. He however stressed that the editor had complete discretion over the process and could determine the fate of the article at any stage.

Expectation of an editor from a reviewer: Dr. S M Baliga/ Dr. Sharath Asokan: Gave us valuable insights into what an editor expects from the reviewers and provided us with good tips and tricks on becoming better at reviewing. Peer reviews are the gold standard for scientific communication, however the biggest hazard to the quality of published literature is the acceptance of low quality work. He spoke about how reviewers should aid in editorial decisions, be prompt, maintain confidentiality and objectivity, provide constructive assessment and be impartial. We were also given tips on how to offer our services as reviewers and be noticed. The session concluded with a brief note on how peer reviewing can be beneficial for the reviewer and take their discipline, research, career and understanding to a higher level.

Critical appraisal: How to read a paper for peer review: Dr. Sumanth K: Talked about the role of peer reviews and how they should take an article from mediocrity to that of a well written piece, suitable for publication. He enumerated on the various assessment tools for different types of studies and mentioned a few questions to ponder upon for good critical appraisal, regarding relevance, novelty, value addition, the type of research question being asked, the appropriateness of the study design, tackling bias, sticking to protocol, etc.

He stressed that references in manuscripts should be relevant and recent, P value worship should be avoided and that negative findings should be given as much weightage as positive findings.

Components of original research- match between hypothesis and methods: Dr. Sumit Malhotra: stressed on how a hypothesis should be a carefully constructed statement about an expected relationship between numerous variables, permitting empirical testing. He explained how exposures and outcomes are related and the types of independent, dependent, predictor and outcome variables. He appraised us on the types of hypothesis, the essential methods of research reporting including study design, sample size calculation and statistical testing. These must be correlated with the hypothesis. We were told about the primary and secondary outcomes to be evaluated, the types of analytical studies, the key questions that the research must answer, the PICOT rule to design a trial, the different concerns regarding sample size, randomization, masking, reporting guidelines and assessment tools.

Making concise the remarks on the manuscript (original research): Tony George Jacob: spoke about the outline of a manuscript and how each component should be adjudged by a reviewer. He spoke about the various expectations from the reviewer, by the editor, the ethical responsibilities, etc. he emphasized that for an article to be of good quality, the science that it reports should be of high quality. He familiarized the reviewers on how to check for and report the relevance and lacunae of the various components of a paper and on the precise ways to provide constructive comments.

How to check whether the manuscript in question is as per journal/ specialty priority: Dr. Suprabha BS spoke about how to review an article and how to decide whether the article is appropriate for a particular journal. She spoke about the importance of assigning priority and checking for the suitability of the manuscript by checking the requirements of the journal in question and whether those requirements are being met. Research that brings to front novel findings should be assigned to high impact journals, whereas confirmatory studies may be assigned to those with lesser impact. She also suggested to give discreet comments to the authors and the editors in step by step manner and described various biases a reviewer can face and how to refrain from them. She reiterated the golden rule of "reviewing for others as you would have others reviewing you."

How to concise your remarks on the paper (systematic reviews)Dr. M Jeevasankar: Systematic review is substantial work and is equal to primary research with respect to the work put in. They are considered as the tier 1 level of evidence. The reviewer must ascertain the focus, novelty and relevance of the review. They should assess whether the authors included difficult to access articles, whether the literature search is comprehensive, the various risks of biases have been properly assessed, data properly extracted, qualitative synthesis—done, heterogeneity handled, included and assessed and the review registered with the appropriate forums. Overall it was a very enlightening talk that made us more comfortable with reviewing a systematic review.

How to concise your remarks on the case report: Dr. Gauri Kalra: Though case reports lie at the bottom of the evidence reliability hierarchy, they provide good observational learning experiences. The reviewer must evaluate the novelty of the case, investigation or the treatment modality and whether it adds any value to the pre-existing studies available. They should assess whether the patient's identity has been satisfactorily hidden, whether the treatment or investigations meted out are ethical, for authenticity and genuineness. Reviewers should look for concise, yet explanatory tables and figures and may suggest additions if they feel it will improve the report. The discussion, being the heart of a case report should be relevant and critically assessed. The reviewer may advise major or minor changes, as deemed fit, keeping in mind the five objectives of documentation, objectivity, uniqueness, educational value and interpretation.

Ethical considerations in publication: Dr. Vijay Prakash Mathur- The session highlighted the ethical considerations during the publication process. An insight into the methodology of how to specify the authors and their contributions in compilation and conduct of a research were described along with acknowledgement of non-author contributors. Redundant and repetition of data in various forms is also considered as a morally incorrect method of publishing. He stressed on the different types of plagiarism that may occur in the article writing process, advised vigilance against it and strongly recommended that reviewers should avoiding borrowing ideas from the manuscript they are reviewing. The onus of ensuring good publications is more with the author and reviewer than the editor of journals.

Demonstration by Dr. Nitesh Tewari- Dr. Nitesh Tewari demonstrated on how to check for plagiarism using the software 'itheticate'. It was advised that not more than 20% plagiarism should be permitted and that postgraduates should be trained to check the plagiarism of their library dissertation and MDS dissertation, so that the right habit is inculcated.






